April 19: Boom Chick Trio





GR Fighting Back: Stories from The Nature Conservancy's Work on Elm, Chestnut, and Other Trees in Peril, Tuesday, March 10 at 7 pm on ZOOM

The stories that make up *North Woods* often use a particular tree as their anchor. With their ability to live for hundreds of years, changes that spread out over several human lifetimes can occur within the lifetime of a single tree—and can sometimes outpace the ability of the tree to adapt to new conditions. Panelists from The Nature Conservancy will share stories about their work with iconic species such as American chestnut and elm across New England.

What stories shaped New England identities in the 17th and 18th centuries? 


